

FOREWORD

Over the past two years, living and working as a humanitarian in Gaza has been personally painful and professionally brutal. I have witnessed children and families visiting Save the Children clinics and services, hungry, injured and emotionally scarred, bearing the wounds of the war on their eyes, bodies and souls.

In this war, I lost my home and my brother, who was a father to five children. He was killed in an Israeli airstrike and bled to death because emergency medical help could not reach him. Since then, I have become a father, mother, friend and guardian to my nieces and nephews.

We live with my 85-year-old mother, who is diabetic with high blood pressure. We have been displaced five times, living in tents against merciless odds with limited access to clean water, food, and healthcare, facing starvation. This war has cost my family and me over 100kg in total weight loss.

Each day, we witness the resilience of families grappling with trauma and deprivation. Together, we deliver lifesaving health and nutrition services, offering hope and healing to Gaza's most vulnerable. To continue doing that we need aid flow to be at the scale and at the pace that fits the growing needs.

WE NEED A DEFINITIVE CEASEFIRE.





EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

After two years of war, the situation for children in Gaza is dire.

More than 20,000 Palestinian children have been killed and at least 39,000 injured by Israeli forces. Families have been forced to relocate multiple times, with nowhere safe to go. Meanwhile, the Israeli authorities continue to restrict the flow of aid into Gaza, preventing food and medicine from reaching families in need. Famine has been officially confirmed in Gaza and children are dying from malnutrition and other preventable causes.

We continue to call for an end to this war through a definitive ceasefire, as well as increased humanitarian access so more lifesaving aid can reach families.

Amidst this humanitarian catastrophe, our local staff and partners in Gaza have worked tirelessly to

provide clean water and sanitation, food, cash and essential items, as well as health, nutrition, child protection, education and mental health services to families in need.

Our teams across the region have continued to support families in Egypt, as well as families affected by escalating violence in the West Bank and the war in Lebanon.

Over the last two years, we've helped:

- 1.66 million (1,660,308) people in Gaza
- 118,510 people in the West Bank
- 11,149 Palestinians in Egypt
- 311,069 people facing violence in Lebanon

This collective impact would not have been possible without help from our generous donors, partners and supporters. Thank you for your support and solidarity.

1.66M PEOPLE SUPPORTED IN GAZA, INCLUDING 811,995 CHILDREN



Set up 26 temporary learning spaces, providing 5,000 children with a safe place to learn, as well as training teachers.



CASH & FOOD SECURITY

401,000 PEOPLE SUPPORTED

Provided cash to 290,970 people, including through innovative e-wallets. We remain one of the largest cash providers in Gaza.

Ran livelihoods programmes, including helping farmers restore food production and investing in young entrepreneurs.



WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE

917,000 PEOPLE SUPPORTED, INCLUDING 423,000 CHILDREN

Provided clean water to 575,441 people via water trucking.

Distributed hygiene kits to 18,079 people, as well as tents and other shelter items.



CHILD PROTECTION & MENTAL HEALTH

89,737 PEOPLE SUPPORTED, INCLUDING 73,737 CHILDREN

Established eight child-friendly spaces and supported 20 more with partners.

Provided tailored support for children with disabilities.

Managed 640 child protection cases through case management services.



HEALTH & NUTRITION

238,791 PEOPLE SUPPORTED, INCLUDING 120,056 CHILDREN

Delivered primary care to 113,643 people through two health clinics.

Treated 13,573 people for malnutrition.

Vaccinated 2,957 children through the UN-led polio campaign.



118,510 PEOPLE SUPPORTED IN THE WEST BANK, INCLUDING 61,583 CHILDREN



Provided 34,755 people with cash assistance in addition to food, water and hygiene kits.



Supported 28,000 children through our child-friendly spaces, as well as tailored case management support.



Supported community-based organisations to provide educational activities to children.



SPOTLIGHT

LOCAL PARTNERS

Our response in the occupied Palestinian territory has been mainly led by our 25 local partner organisations, including 12 partners in Gaza.

Throughout our response, we've helped local partners overcome challenges, including fuel shortages, aid blockages and global funding cuts, so they can continue helping families who need it most.

Here are just a few examples:

ATFALUNA SOCIETY

Atfaluna Society was badly hit by the drastic aid funding cuts earlier this year. We provided flexible funding to cover staff salaries and repairs for assistive devices, so the team could continue supporting children with disabilities.

MA'AN DEVELOPMENT CENTRE

Ongoing fuel shortages significantly impacted MA'AN's ability to deliver aid. We supported their Gaza office with solar power solutions and IT system upgrades, so they could continue delivering essential items like warm clothes to families.

TAMER INSTITUTE FOR COMMUNITY EDUCATION

We worked with the Tamer Institute to implement a hybrid learning model for children. This included providing learning kits and books through community volunteers, helping children to keep learning outside the classroom while supporting their wellbeing.

OUR REGIONAL RESPONSE

EGYPT AND LEBANON

Egypt:

Over the past two years, our teams and partners in Egypt have played a crucial role in packing trucks of food, water and medical supplies to enter Gaza via the Rafah border crossing, when access allowed.

We've also supported 11,149 Palestinians in Egypt, including medical evacuees from Gaza and displaced families.

Here's how we've helped families:

PROVIDED MEDICAL CARE TO 1,000 PEOPLE

DELIVERED \$830,000 IN MEDICAL SUPPLIES TO EGYPTIAN HOSPITALS

RAN CHILD-FRIENDLY SPACES FOR 700+ CHILDREN.

OFFERED MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT TO 1.600+ PEOPLE.

PROVIDED CASH ASSISTANCE TO 7,900+ PEOPLE.

Lebanon:

It's been over one year since conflict escalated in Lebanon in September 2024, causing tens of thousands of families to flee their homes and disrupting children's learning.

Over the past year, we've helped more than 311,000 people, including 131,000 children, in Lebanon.

Here's how we've helped families:

SUPPORTED 154,000 PEOPLE WITH WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE FACILITIES.


PROVIDED 77,000 PEOPLE WITH FOOD SECURITY, CASH AND LIVELIHOODS PROGRAMS.

DISTRIBUTED SAFE SHELTER AND BASIC ITEMS TO 29,000 PEOPLE.

PROVIDED 26,500 PEOPLE WITH NUTRITION SUPPORT.

REACHED 17,500 CHILDREN WITH EDUCATION SUPPORT.

ENSURED 2,800 CHILDREN RECEIVED PROTECTION AND MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT.



YOUR SUPPORT IN ACTION

Thanks to our incredible supporters, partners and donors, we've raised **\$151.73 million** to support our response across the region since October 2023. This includes **\$121 million** for the occupied Palestinian territory (including Gaza and the West Bank), **\$5.13 million** for Egypt and **\$25.6 million** for Lebanon.



THE CHILDRENS EMERGENCY FUND

The Children's Emergency Fund continues to provide flexible funding to our teams in the occupied Palestinian territory, Egypt and Lebanon. Flexibility is critical in such a complex operating environment, as it allows our teams to adapt and innovate to keep services running for children.

Since October 2023, the Children's Emergency Fund has provided over \$33.5 million to our teams in the occupied Palestinian territory, \$1.3 million to our teams in Egypt and \$3 million to our teams in Lebanon. This includes \$4.5 million (14% of funds) to our partners in Gaza.



PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

As we look ahead, the future for families in the occupied Palestinian territory is uncertain. But we remain steadfast in our commitment to keep helping children and families caught up in this war.

Through our global advocacy and campaigns, we continue to call for an immediate and definitive ceasefire and for the Government of Israel to lift the siege and allow humanitarian access.

In the coming months and year, we will prioritise keeping our staff and partners safe while continuing to deliver our lifesaving programmes, including:



Scaling-up our health, nutrition, water, sanitation and cash programming in Gaza to meet families' most urgent needs.



Continue running two primary health clinics and eight Mother/Baby Areas.



Expanding our child protection and education services through child-friendly spaces in Gaza and mobile teams in the West Bank.



Providing rehabilitation and reintegration support for former child detainees in the West Bank.
